Ancram Community Days Celebrate Kids, Families, and Our History

Bring the family and join your neighbors on Saturday, August 14, and Sunday, August 15, for the Second Annual Ancram Community Days. Proceeds will go to the Ancram Youth Commission's new playground, so you'll see lots of kid-friendly activities—a water slide, face painting, pony rides, exotic amphibians, and donated gifts for kids—you can buy chances to win and then share the gift with the little one of your choice.

Indoors, you'll find Clara Van Tassel and Robin Massa, and they invite you to bring in your historic family photos or old photos of places in Ancram—they'll have a scanner at the ready so your memories can become part of our town's history.

At 11 a.m., in Town Hall, the Ancram Preservation Group (APG) will present to our town an historic 1856 quilt that includes the names of farming families from that time. Jack Lindsey, former Town Board member and APG member, notes that the APG tries "to save the important histories of local families, and the quilt represents one in a series of initiatives, including preserving Simon's Store and the Steihle House."

Over at Simon's General Store, you'll find a tag sale from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., sponsored by the Ancram Angels and the APG. Featured items include an antique quilt, Victorian-era birdcage, vintage clothing and accessories, home décor, Japanese kimonos, chandeliers, books, and music. You'll find wonderful things to buy, and all proceeds go to help build the playground.

Sunday—all-faith service followed by potluck brunch

Come to the all-faith service at 9:30 a.m. at the Ancramdale Presbyterian Church, followed by a potluck brunch at next-door Fellowship Hall at 11 a.m. Bring a dish your family loves, and the rest of us will probably enjoy it just as much.


Let's Play!

Vote August 21 on Highway Garage

The Town Board voted to hold a special election on Saturday, August 21, from noon to 9 p.m. at Ancram Town Hall to get approval to borrow up to \$400,000 toward building a new highway garage at its current site.

Although the Town will have approximately \$650,000 in the bank by the end of the year, and could pay for the garage renovations without borrowing, the Town Board elected to get voter approval to borrow up to \$400,000 in order to keep higher reserves in case the economy worsens.

The Board has said there will be no new taxes needed to pay any loan back. The Board has determined it can reduce the annual budget by \$100,000 and pay back any loan within five years.

The Board estimates the new town garage will last the town 60 years or more. It can house all the town's equipment with room to spare for expansion. The garage will feature radiant heat in a concrete floor, a new septic and well, and expanded staff facilities.

Protect Your Home from Fire Damage

On Saturday, August 14, bring your fire extinguisher to Ancram Community Days between 9 a.m. and noon outside Town Hall so that representatives from Sausbiers can fill or recharge it (if possible). They will also sell extinguishers. The Ancram Fire Co. arranged for Sausbiers to provide this service.

We Have an Ambitious "To Do" List

It's hard to believe it's August already. As I look back, we've accomplished a lot, and we also have important business on our "to do" list for the rest of the year.

Since January, we've brought town expenditures under better control (lower than budget), and we've provided financial updates every month. Volunteers painted Town Hall, and contributions from more than 50 donors covered all costs. The board adopted the Comprehensive Plan, and we've begun work to bring our zoning into compliance with the plan. We've moved forward on creating a much-needed, improved Town Garage.

Looking forward, here's what I hope we can accomplish by working together effectively the rest of this year:

- Hold town taxes flat for our 2011 budget, and allocate \$100,000 of spending from business-as-usual items to repaying the garage loan.
- Set up a capital reserve for major equipment and facilities investments.
- Continue making progress on our zoning revisions and farmland protection planning efforts.
- Expand and renovate the Town Garage where it is.
- Pass new town laws for Cell Towers, Wind Turbines, and Ethics.
- Consider passing local laws, subject to a town referendum in November, extending the terms of the town supervisor, town clerk, and highway superintendent to four-year terms, like other town officials, starting with the 2011 election.
- Begin a long-term Ancram Recreation Plan to see how to best use the Town Hall site and Blass Park, and develop walking and biking trails, and other recreational facilities.
- Establish policies and procedures for purchasing, personnel, and investments.
- Raise funds to build a new playground at Town Hall in 2011.
- Upgrade our town website, making it more informative and easier to use.
- Make Friendship Hall in Ancramdale handicapped-accessible in order to keep it open as a poling place. Neighbors Helping Neighbors has already raised more than \$2,500 for this project.


