New State Burn Law Now in Effect

To reduce air pollution, the Department of Environmental Conservation now prohibits burning household garbage, paper and leaves. You can burn tree limbs and branches, with leaves attached, less than 6 inches in diameter and 8 feet in length, from May 15 to March 15, but all brush burning is prohibited from March 16 through May 14 each year. All year, you can use outdoor barbecue grills; you can have a campfire that is no more than 4 x 4 x 3-feet high; and agricultural businesses can burn organic materials generated on the farm. Illegal burning is considered a misdemeanor with a fine of \$375. Youth Commission Proposes New Town Playground

The Youth Commission announced plans to construct a 75 x 85-foot playground in Ancram. There are 350 to 400 children ages 2 to 14 in town (from full- and part-time family residents) who would enjoy such a playground. Bob Wilcox, Youth Commission member, presented the playground proposal at the April Town Board meeting. He said the \$82,500 budget included \$40,000 for equipment; \$25,000 for site preparation; \$10,000 for materials; plus, contingencies at \$7,500.

The Youth Commission, chaired by Ruth Wittlinger, will contribute \$10,000 toward this project. The Youth Commission asked the Town to provide an equal amount, which the Town Board agreed to do; the rest will come from fundraising and grants. Bob and Councilman Chris Thomas have contributed their town salaries of \$2,500 each.

Town to Review Tax Assessments

Chris Thomas, chair of the Revaluation Committee, has received board approval to retain GAR Associates, an appraisal and reassessment consulting firm, to review the Town's property tax assessment data. For a \$4,500 fee, the firm will sample 10% of each property type in Town, which will help determine if the Town needs a complete revaluation.

The firm will also provide an informational seminar, possibly at two different times, to help Ancram residents better understand how revaluations are done.

Chris notes that Tagkhanic currently pays this same firm \$10,000 a year to help keep their assessments at 100%.

Many Positive Activities in Town *by Town Supervisor Art Bassin*

A lot of good things are happening, and you can learn more about many of them in this newsletter. Here, I'd like to share briefly more good news. For example, we're installing solar panels on Town Hall. We plan to meet with AT&T to talk about where to put cell towers for improved service. The Planning Board and ZBA are working on the first application for wind towers. And, I was especially pleased to see the Town Board approve the Comprehensive Plan at our last meeting.

Jim MacArthur and the highway crew are working hard to repair roads damaged by frost over the winter, and they plan to pave Poole Hill as soon as state funds are available. We got the Contamination Assessment Report on the current garage site, confirming there is no petroleum contamination, so we can use the existing site for the new garage. The Garage Committee is looking at expanding and renovating the current 80 x 32-foot four-bay facility into an 80 x 80-foot garage. If this works, we could further reduce the cost of a new garage.

Finally, we're working with the County Board of Elections to keep the Ancramdale polling place open. The County has said we need to make Friendship Hall accessible to handicapped voters or they must close this polling place. We hope to buy a handicapped-accessible ramp for Friendship Hall, and we may need to raise money with community donations to install the ramp.



Town Budget in Brief

In his monthly budget summary, Supervisor Art Bassin points out it's too early in the year, with too many unknowns, to predict how the year will play out.

He says the problems facing both the state and county may cause a spike in school and property taxes in the next few years, which puts more pressures on our taxpayers.

"In this environment," he cautions, "we need to be very careful how we spend our money for the next few years.

"We know we can't afford to do everything, so we will have to focus on the important priorities."
